ADDITIONAL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR ASSOCIATE OF SCIENCE DEGREE

- No developmental courses may be applied to this degree.
- Minimum Grade Point Average 2.0 is required for the degree.
- The official graduation contract is based on the NJC catalog in effect when the student formally matriculated into the program of study under which she/he plans to graduate.

COLORADO GUARANTEED TRANSFER PROGRAM FOR GENERAL EDUCATION (gtPATHWAYS)

These Courses are guaranteed to transfer with you and count toward your general education core or graduation requirements for most, but not all, associate's or bachelor's degree programs. If you completed a course before it became effective as a gtPATHWAYS course, the institution to which you transfer has the option to accept it or not accept it. If you complete an Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree, 60 credits are guaranteed to transfer to a Colorado public four-year school, once you are accepted for admission. You should be able to finish a bachelor's degree within another 60 credits. This is called a 60+60 transfer plan. Please note that some majors at the four-year school require specific courses that must be completed as part of the A.A or A.S degree. Note also that some majors may exceed the typical 120 credits required to graduate. Additional notes regarding transfer:

Only courses completed with a "C" or higher will be eligible to transfer.

Transferring credit to NJC. Transfer courses will be evaluated for NJC course equivalency and applied to degree requirements according to state and college policy. Completion of general education course requirements by transfer from any private or out-of-state public institution may meet NJC degree requirements but could invalidate the 60+60 guaranteed transfer. The receiving institution will evaluate those credits according to its standard policy.

Credit for Prior Learning: Credit earned through prior learning methodologies (including CLEP, Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, articulation, military, corporate, challenge exam, portfolio credit, substitutions, correspondence courses, or independent study) may meet NJC degree requirements but could invalidate the 60+60 guaranteed transfer. The receiving institution will evaluate those credits according to its standard policy. Students who wish to use credits awarded by exam to fulfill specific course requirements are responsible for consulting with the institution to which they are considering transferring to determine whether the credits they have been awarded by exam meet the standards of the receiving institution for specific course equivalents.
