- 1. All of these prerequisites must be completed with a grade of "C" or better.
- 2. A cumulative GPA of 2.5 is required for all prerequisites listed above except Pathophysiology, Math, and Nutrition. The GPA does not include the LPN program.
- 3. All BIO prefixes and/or science courses are valid for 7 years from the time of completion to the start of the Nursing Program.

#### **Program Acceptance**

The following must be completed prior to acceptance into the program:

- 1. Accuplacer or ACT scores or comparable course work to show Math, Reading and English are at college level
- 2. A Kaplan Admission Test score.
- 3. A GPA of 2.5 on all prerequisites is required, and a grade of "C" or better for each prerequisite course.
- 4. LPN program graduate with Colorado or compact state licensure in good standing.
- 5. LPN graduation of 3 to 10 years prior, documentation of 1,000 hours of work experience as a LPN <u>OR</u>
  - Successful completion of a refresher course approved by the Colorado Council of Nurse Educators or the equivalent thereof (nursing course work as specified by the accepting institution).
- 6. LPN graduation of 10 plus years prior needs to meet the criteria for 3 years prior and testing of competency is required.

All students will be admitted provisionally until the following have been completed:

- Satisfactory Criminal Background Check (Not to be done any earlier than 90 days of start date into the program)
- Satisfactory FBI Record Check
- Current Health statement/immunization update
- Negative drug screen
- Current Professional CPR Certificate that is valid for the entire length of the program

## **Criminal Background Check**

<u>All</u> Colorado community college nursing students are required to take and pass the background checks available at this web site address: <u>www.healthcareex.com/</u> for the list of disqualifying offenses refer to <u>www.cccs.edu</u> under the nursing section.

The faculty and personnel of the Nursing Program do not guarantee or promise that any student will be accepted or acceptable to every facility, clinical lab, practitioner, affiliates, or others who may provide training or other services for the Nursing Programs.

#### **Graduation Requirements**

A student is responsible for meeting all graduation requirements. Advisors may assist in planning programs, but the **final responsibility for fulfilling all graduation requirements rests with the student.** 

## **Policy Concerning Health**

- 1. Health Policy: A student is required to have a physical examination by a health care provider <u>PRIOR TO ENTRY</u> into the program. A required health form will be used.
  - 1. A student is required to have a physical examination by a health care provider PRIOR TO ENTRY into the program. A health form is provided by the program office specific to program requirements and is the only form accepted for health clearance.
  - 2. Required vaccinations as a condition of program admission (required <u>PRIOR TO PROGRAM ENTRY</u>)
    - a. Hepatitis B: 3-dose series (#1 now, #2 in 1 month, #3 approximately 5 months after dose #2); positive serologic titer; or signed vaccine waiver
    - b. MMR: must have serologic evidence of immunity (positive titer for all 3 rubeola, rubella, and mumps) or needs 2 doses of MMR 4 weeks apart
    - c. Varicella: serologic proof (positive titer) of immunity or prior vaccination or needs 2 doses of varicella vaccine, 4 weeks apart
    - d. Tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis: a one-time dose of Tdap with Td boosters every 10 years thereafter
    - e. Flu vaccine: One influenza vaccine <u>every</u> flu season. The ADN student will be required to obtain a dose before the start of the program and again by Oct. 1<sup>st</sup> of each fall semester (2 doses in the program for 2 separate flu seasons).
  - 3. Required PPD (Tuberculin testing) testing: the 2-step process is required. If student has had 1 PPD in the last 12 months a second PPD is required within 3 months of program start. If the student has no history of PPD in last 12 months 2 PPDs are required. The second test is often given 1 week after the first test.
  - 4. Student Health Services are available through the Family Care Clinic at 615 Fairhurst in Sterling. When the student calls to set up an appointment at the clinic identify yourself as a NJC student. The student must contact his/her own physician or Sterling Regional Med Center for treatment of illness or injury during evening and night hours and weekends. The student is responsible for the cost of Emergency Department treatments. The Outpatient Department may be used upon referral from a local physician for designated diagnoses.
  - 5. Health insurance is the responsibility of the student. Any injury that occurs in the classroom or lab that requires treatment will be the responsibility of the student.

# COLORADO ASSOCIATE DEGREE NURSING PROGRAMS POLICY STATEMENT ON THE ESSENTIAL CLINICAL EXPECTATIONS FOR THE STUDENT NURSE

Northeastern Junior College nursing program embraces the following statement by the Colorado Council on Nursing Education and expects students in the Nursing Program to fulfill them.

Student nursing practice includes assessment, analysis, planning, implementation, and evaluation. The process integrates cognitive, affective, and psychomotor skills. Competency statements developed by the Colorado Council on Nursing Education are designed to reflect current educational outcomes. The faculty in Colorado has identified the following nursing roles: provider, advocate, teacher, manager, and member of the profession. The Registered Nurse license granted upon successful completion of the NCLEX-RN exam is non-restrictive. Because practice is not limited to any particular area the learning experiences of the student must be broad enough to cover all clinical areas, knowledge, and practical skills expected of a job entry-level nurse.

To achieve these competencies, skills must be learned and practiced at job entry levels. Clinical practice is evaluated utilizing the clinical evaluation tools for each course. A general overview of the Essential Program Requirements for the Student Nurse is as follows:

- Establish and maintain a professional nursing relationship with the client and/or family.
- Independently perform health assessment, interviewing, and examination.
- Provide physical care for persons of all ages, size, gender, race, national origin or disability, whether conscious and helpful, or unconscious and helpless. This includes, but is not limited to, helping the client move in bed, move out of bed, and assist in walking.
- Use nursing knowledge, skills, and established protocols to safely perform nursing measures according to the needs of the client/family.
- Perform a variety of sterile and non-sterile nursing procedures safely and accurately on clients.
- Use a variety of technical and mechanical equipment safely and accurately.
- Assume responsibility for nursing care of the client/family in structured settings.
- Implement a variety of strategies to educate the client/family, according to their needs.
- Use critical thinking to review and analyze data to identify potential, emerging, and/or actual client/family problems.
- Develop nursing care goals with the client/family.
- Document client data, nursing care, and client/family responses.
- Use management concepts within a health care delivery system.
- Assume responsibility for professional self-development.
- Assume accountability for quality nursing practice.
- Function as a member of the health care team, in compliance with the Nurse Practice Act and its Rules and Regulations.
- Reasonable accommodation will be made in an effort to help students meet program requirements and objectives.

## **Requirements for Licensure**

In order to work as a professional nurse in Colorado, a graduate must secure a license from the State of Colorado as an RN. Certain information related to having a previous criminal record or having a chemical dependency problem (drugs or alcohol) is requested when applying for licensure. The following information is requested:

- 1. Has any nursing or other health care license held by you been denied, revoked, suspended, reprimanded, fined, surrendered, restricted, limited, or placed on probation in any state other than Colorado or in any territory of the United States?
- 2. Are you under investigation or is a disciplinary action pending against your nursing license or other health care license in any state or territory of the United States?
- 3. Have you received notification from the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of the Inspector General, that you have been excluded from participation in Medicare, Medicaid or any federal health care programs based on program related crimes and discipline?
- 4. Have you ever been convicted, entered a plea of guilty, nolo contendere, or no contest for any felony, misdemeanor or petty offense?
- 5. Have you ever been convicted, pled no contest/nolo contendere, or had a court accept a plea to a criminal motor vehicle offense of DUI/DWI/DWAI/OWI or any traffic offense involving drugs or alcohol?
- 6. Has any final judgment, settlement or arbitration award for malpractice been paid by you or on your behalf?
- 7. In the last five years, have you been diagnosed with or treated for a condition that significantly disturbs your cognition, behavior, or motor function, or that may impair your ability to practice as a professional nurse safely and competently, such as bipolar disorder, severe major depression, schizophrenia or other major psychotic disorder, a neurological illness, or sleep disorder?
- 8. Do you now abuse or excessively use, or have you in the last five years abused or excessively used, any habit forming drug, including alcohol, or any controlled substance that has a) resulted in any accusation or discipline for misconduct, unreliability, neglect of work, or failure to meet professional responsibilities; or b) affected your ability to practice as a professional nurse safely and competently?
- 9. Have you been terminated or permitted to resign in lieu of termination from a nursing or other health care position because of your use of alcohol or use of any controlled substance, habit-forming drug, prescription medication, or drugs having similar effects?

10. Have you been arrested for an alcohol or drug-related offense other than stated in question No. 5?

If any question is answered "yes", the student needs to meet with the Director of the Nursing Program for counseling as the Colorado State Board of Nursing has specified requirements for licensure that must be met.

The State Board of Nursing will consider whether a person can be licensed if s/he has had a criminal record or chemical dependency problem on an individual basis. Having had the problem does not necessarily mean that licensure will be denied. However, the Board is very strict about individuals being truthful about past problems. If an individual is not truthful on the application form and the Board finds out, licensure is denied. The Board has the following information on the application form:

Please be advised that in Colorado, supplying false information in application for licensure is punishable by law.

I state under penalty of perjury in the second degree, as defined in 18-8-503, Colorado Revised Statutes, that the information contained in this application is true and correct to the best of my knowledge. I understand that under the Nurse Practice Act, providing false information is grounds for denial, suspension or revocation of a Nursing License and may be punishable by law. You may not practice as a Nurse as defined in CRS, 1985, 12-38-111(112), until you have completed the requirements for licensure.

#### STUDENT INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

**ADN Nursing Club:** Students are offered the opportunity to participate in a student organization focusing on behaviors and attitudes that reflect professionalism within the nursing discipline. Participation is optional and includes activities to support and positively influence the goals of the nursing program, college, and community. Participation includes planning and fundraising for the pinning ceremony at the completion of the nursing program.

ADN Nursing Club Student Officers: Students will be elected to represent the LPN to ADN nursing program on campus, the Student Faculty Liaison Committee, and the Advisory Council (generally the president) during each academic year. Offices held include president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and one or two CAB representatives. The role of secretary and treasurer can be combined and president and vice president can be combined for co-president roles if the class votes as such. The CAB representatives will alternate meeting attendance. The CAB representative(s) is required to attend the NJC campus meeting for the College Activities Board which occurs weekly in the Hays Student Center. The officer team may decide that all members will take a turn in attending the ASG/CAB meetings.

**Student-Faculty Liaison Committee:** A committee will be formed comprised of student elected class officers and full-time faculty. The committees focus will be to bring forth student input which encourages student and faculty collaboration in a quality improvement process.

Several social activities which require the attendance of all students are included in the program. Examples of planned activities include:

- a. Pinning ceremony practice, luncheon, and related activities
- b. Professional In-services

#### MISCELLANEOUS STUDENT PROCEDURES/POLICIES

#### Social Media Procedure

Students are expected to adhere to the social media procedure outlined in the Student Code of Conduct found in the College Catalog. The Catalog is available upon request in hard copy from the document center in Walker Hall, or may be accessed in pdf format in the Publications section of the College website at <a href="https://www.njc.edu">www.njc.edu</a>

Students must exercise caution when using social networking sites, such as Facebook. Students must remember that what is posted may be accessible to the public, including NJC administration and faculty and future employers.

Examples of content that reflects negative or questionable motives include but are not limited to: postings about clinical sites or patients, comments about fellow students or faculty, and photos of social activities involving (or those that could be construed as) involving illegal or inappropriate actions or behaviors.

#### **Cell Phone**

Cell phones need to be turned off during class time. In case of emergency messages can be left with the administrative assistant at 970-521-6701. Cell phones are not to be used during clinical hours. Cell phones need to be left in the student's car during clinical hours. Any student found using their cell phone or texting during classroom or clinical will have an incident report placed in their file and may be sent home from clinical. The missed clinical must be made up per policy.

#### **Academic Policies**

- 1. It will be necessary to maintain an overall grade point average of 2.0 or "C." A "D" or below in any required class, will result in a counseled withdrawal from the program. See specific guidelines in the remainder of this section.
- 2. All academic courses require a "C" in order to receive credit. The Associate Degree in Applied Science in Nursing will not be awarded without a "C" or better in all courses.
  - a. Students must maintain a minimum of a "C" average (at least 77%) on total exam scores in each course to receive credit. If a student has a "C" or better average in the course but is less than 77% on exam scores the student will not receive credit for the class. The highest grade awarded to the student in this situation will be a "D".
  - b. All clinical courses are graded weekly. Students must have an average clinical grade greater than or equal to 77% in order to successfully pass each clinical component. If the student scores less than a 77% average for the clinical experience, the student will not receive credit for the class and the highest grade awarded will be a "D". The clinical component will be calculated into the total course grade for classes which require a clinical component. The clinical component is worth 30% of the total grade for these courses.
- 3. If a student does not achieve 77% or greater in <u>any</u> component (theory, lab, and/or clinical) of any course the student will ultimately fail the entire course.
- 4. Nursing exams take skill and practice to complete successfully. Nursing faculty would encourage any student who needs to improve test taking skills to set up a meeting with faculty to do a detailed test analysis of a past test by completing the Test Analysis Tool (found at end of handbook). The Comprehensive Learning Center also can assist students with test taking skills.
- 5. If a student takes a test and believes a test question has been marked wrong in error the student may compete a Test Item Query form (found at end of handbook). The form must be turned in to the instructor no later than one week after reviewing the test. There will be no class time used to argue or debate exam questions.

- 6. Students are encouraged to seek assistance from the Comprehensive Learning Center in the library, if needed, as early as possible. Tutors in nursing subjects are made available to those students needing assistance. In addition, nursing program faculty will serve as tutors in nursing subjects and skills and will be available 2 to 3 hours per week in open lab time to any student interested and in need of assistance. A tutoring schedule will be prepared and posted at the beginning of each semester. Open lab hours can be used for tutoring on nursing subjects, assistance with or remediation of clinical/laboratory skills, and assistance with clinical paperwork. In addition, if a student drops below a 77% test score average at any point in the semester the student will be required to log in 2 hours in the nursing lab or CLC. It is the responsibility of the student to sign in at the CLC and/or the open lab to document attendance. Weekly reports are sent to the nursing program faculty from the CLC for student attendance at the CLC.
- 7. In order to make up a test due to an absence the student must call the administrative assistant before the test is given. No test will be allowed to be made up if there is not prior notification. The test is to be made up the next school day or at the earliest date as determined by faculty.
- 8. Associate Degree nursing students must pass a dosage calculations test with 100% in NUR 189 at the start of the program. In each subsequent term/semester, all nursing students will be given an additional dosage calculations test at the start of each term and are required to obtain a 100% by a date established by faculty. Failure to obtain these scores ultimately may result in failure of clinical. Students will have the opportunity to retake the dosage calculations test until 100% is achieved. However, math remediation may be required and may include independent study and/or additional math course(s).
- 9. Grading scale for program. (The grading scale will carry to the  $10^{th}$  decimal place).

#### 10. Kaplan

Northeastern Junior College implements the Kaplan Integrated Testing Program and NCLEX-RN review into the nursing curriculum for purposes of identifying areas of strength and improvements needed in the student nursing population. Students are encouraged to fully use this service to assist in his or her educational process. Kaplan provides numerous practice assessments that are accessible to students throughout the program and may be required before administration of proctored assessments. Selected courses each semester will have Kaplan examinations that will assess the level of knowledge in particular areas. Remediation will be used to correct student's knowledge deficits and to enhance areas of proficient knowledge.

Before students take the secured (proctored) Kaplan tests the student may be assigned a Kaplan practice test and remediation on the practice test as a ticket to take the

secured (proctored) Kaplan exam. If the practice test is used before a proctored exam, no student will be allowed to take the secured (proctored) test until this is complete.

Success Plan/Progression: Scores on the secured (proctored) Kaplan examinations will comprise a component of the course grade. 10% of the course grade will be based on achievement of proficiency levels as described in the following paragraph.

Kaplan proctored exams are used in NJC's nursing programs to give the student an indication of performance probability in specific content areas and/or on the NCLEX-RN in totality. All students should aim for proficiency on all exams.

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Below proficiency Level 0: \leq 40^{\text{th}} percentile = students will receive a grade of 60% Below proficiency Level 1: 41^{\text{st}} -50<sup>th</sup> percentile = students will receive a grade of 70% \geq 51^{\text{st}} percentile = students will receive a grade of 80%
```

Remediation on each exam is required. Students are required to complete remediation on all questions including questions that were answered correctly. Students must remediate for at least 45 seconds on each question, regardless of whether it was answered correctly or incorrectly. A portion of the student's grade for this component will come from remediation as described in the following section.

Please note: Program faculty and directors can view total time remediated on each question in a report provided by Kaplan. Remediation is to benefit the student and is the most important part of the testing process. Please take testing and remediation seriously.

#### 11. NCLEX Review Class

There is a <u>mandatory</u> NCLEX review course offered at the end of the fall semester of the LPN to ADN program usually in the first two weeks of December. This course generally lasts from 8 am to 4 pm and includes pre and post-testing of all students. **Please plan for full days from Tuesday through Friday of both weeks**. It may include live or on-line instruction and may include activities each student must complete before, during, and after the course is offered. The goal is to assist nursing students in preparation for taking the NCLEX-RN exam upon successful completion of the LPN to ADN program.

#### **Academic Integrity Procedure**

Ethics is an integral part of the foundation of nursing. Ethics can be defined simply as a discipline that looks at what is good or bad; wrong or right; and also deals with moral obligation and duty (Merriam Webster Dictionary, 2011). It should be apparent the important place ethics has within the discipline of nursing. Ethics begins for the discipline along the academic path for each and every nursing student. Recognition of the importance of ethics to the nursing profession led to the development of a Code of Ethics for Nurses. One of the purposes of the Code of Ethics for Nurses is to state the "ethical obligations and duties of every individual who **enters the nursing profession**"; and this means that each nursing student at Northeastern Junior College will be held to this standard. Provision 5 of the Code of Ethics for Nurses lays the groundwork for academic integrity at NJC in the nursing programs.

## Provision 5: The nurse owes the same duties to self as to others, including the responsibility to preserve integrity and safety, to maintain competence, and to continue personal and professional growth.

Nursing students are required to incorporate extremely large amounts of new information into their knowledge base for a successful transition from student to professional nurse. NJC nursing students are expected to maintain the highest standards of academic honesty and integrity. Unless specified otherwise, all work submitted by a student is to be the original creation of that student. Penalties for plagiarism, cheating, falsifying work or other acts of academic dishonesty may result in academic as well as disciplinary sanctions which include, but are not limited to, verbal or written warning to the student, no credit or reduced credit for an assignment, administrative withdrawal from the course, "F" grade for the course, probation, suspension, or expulsion from the college. If a student is willing to compromise their personal integrity, thereby the integrity of the profession of nursing by cheating or being dishonest in their completion of their academic coursework, the question arises regarding compromising the safety of the patient, either as a student or in future professional practice and will not be tolerated in the nursing programs at Northeastern Junior College.

## **Personal Appearance**

#### Clinical

The student's appearance is a reflection of not only him/herself, but also of his/her school and the clinical facility. Clothing should be clean, wrinkle-free, and in good condition. Shoes must be clean and mostly black (polished if appropriate). The student should be well-groomed, including well-manicured nails no longer than ¼ inch. No artificial nails or nail polish of any kind are allowed for nursing students.

The student will wear the student uniform in the clinical facilities or professional dress depending on the clinical site. When obtaining information regarding patients in the clinical facility, a white lab coat with NJC's student nurse patch and name badge must be worn over professional dress (business casual attire with closed-toe shoes). No jeans, shorts, t-shirts bearing logos or writing, tank tops, or open-toe shoes will be allowed in the clinical area at any time.

- 1. Uniforms must be black. Scrub tops must be the V-necked style with 2 pockets. The scrub tops must have NO snaps or buttons. White t-shirts (short or long-sleeved) may be worn under scrub tops. Long-sleeved white t-shirts must have a band around wrist to keep the sleeves up when pushed up to help protect the sterile field during procedures. Scrub pants should be at least ankle length and not drag on the floor. If a student chooses scrub pants of the "low-rise" or "hip hugger" style, the pants must cover all undergarments at all times. Scrub pants with cargo style pockets are appropriate. NJC nursing patch is to be secured via Velcro, fabric glue, snaps or sewn on the left sleeve of all scrub tops and the lab jacket, 2 inches below shoulder level.
- 2. All students must have **mostly** black nursing shoes. High-quality tennis shoes, such as Reebok or Nike, are acceptable as long as they are mostly black (small colored stripe or "swoosh" are acceptable). Clogs with a back strap may be worn. No opentoed shoes, canvas shoes, or Crocs with holes on the top of the shoe are allowed in the clinical areas at any time.
- 3. Clean, well-trimmed, well-groomed hair is required. All students must wear their hair in a style that prevents hair from being over the face or eyes or that falls freely on the uniform below the collar line. Male students will have facial hair neatly trimmed.
- 4. Complete uniform includes name tag, wristwatch with a second hand, scissors, black pen, pencil, notebook, stethoscope, blood pressure cuff, penlight, and gait belt. Missing any of these items at clinical will result in being sent home and will count as an absence for the student.
- 5. Jewelry and make-up should be kept at a minimum. Students must not wear nail polish. Wedding bands and only one pair of small earrings are allowed in the clinical setting. One pair of small earrings is allowed in **ears only.**

- 6. No jewelry is allowed in piercings other than the ear lobes.
- 7. No visible body art or tattoos allowed in the clinical setting. Any visible tattoos or body art must be covered with a flesh-covered bandage.

Any violation of these standards may result in the student being sent home from clinical. The missed clinical must be made up according to policy.

#### Classroom

In respect for the learning environment of others, the student should refrain from wearing revealing clothing. Deep v-necks and pants that do not cover undergarments and the lower back areas should be avoided. Students may wear street clothes in the classroom and laboratory settings as long as the clothing follows these regulations.

#### Laboratory

Students are required to wear their black scrubs with NJC student nurse patch to all laboratory activities except for scheduled open labs.

#### **Clinical Information**

There are written statements of agreement between the college and the clinical agencies. Students are mandated to meet all the requirements of these agreements. It is understood and agreed that the agency may withdraw the students from any specific area which is not conducive to optimum learning experiences and may withdraw any student from any area when the student's actions, attitudes, or conduct may, in the agency's judgment, have a detrimental effect on the patients or personnel. Students are expected to abide by all policies of the affiliating institution which may include random drug screen and criminal background checks. If a clinical agency denies a student access to clinical experiences at their location the Nursing Program must adhere to the agencies request. This may mean the identified student may not be able to complete the program requirements and would therefore be withdrawn or dropped from the program.

#### Additional clinical information includes:

- 1. Familiarity with equipment and procedures is necessary before arriving at the clinical facility. It is expected that the student will review and practice skills in the nursing lab prior to their clinical experience.
- 2. The student is expected to prepare for patient care prior to the clinical experience. Patient care is only allowed with an instructor/facility representative present.
- 3. The student needs to arrive to the clinical site with completed clinical paperwork for each patient or appropriate paperwork for the clinical site.

- 4. All medications must be researched prior to clinical hours. New medications must be researched prior to administration. Ability to calculate the dosage and administer medications through all appropriate routes is mandatory.
- 5. Report pertinent changes in patient's health status immediately to instructor and RN assigned to the patient that day.
- 6. Students may not accept gifts or social invitations from patients. Nursing students must be mindful of their conduct when in the clinical facility. Conduct should be professional at all times.
- 7. Students are expected to:
  - a. Refrain from engaging in client care when the student's physical or emotional condition is a threat to client and/or others carrying out nursing interventions in a safe manner.
  - b. Engage in nursing practice in accordance with the student's level of preparation, legal limitations, and agency policy.
  - c. Communicate with faculty and health team members honestly and accurately, including reporting errors of omission or commission to appropriate persons.
  - d. Seek appropriate supervision and/or consultation in planning and providing nursing care.
- 8. Students will limit their lunch or dinner breaks in accordance with agency policy for nursing staff. The meal break should be taken with consideration of the patient's condition, planned treatments or medications, and the overall staffing needs of the nursing unit. Other breaks, such as coffee breaks, are permitted if the agency policies permit, and should be limited. Students are required to inform the nursing instructor and staff when they leave the unit for meals, breaks, or conferences.
- 9. All IV starts will be observed by an RN.
- 10. Students cannot transcribe doctor's orders independently.
- 11. Preceptor/instructor, staff nurse must observe all calculations, preparations and administration of IV push medications and mix solutions. Must observe all subcutaneous, intramuscular, or intradermal medication administration and all controlled substances administration (EXCEPTION: flushing peripheral PRN IV devices).

#### Injury occurring in the clinical area

When a student has been injured in a clinical area immediate notification of the clinical supervisor is expected. The student needs to seek emergency treatment at the nearest emergency department. Human Resources at NJC must be notified of occurrence for Workman's Compensation procedures and will be followed by the Occumed department at Sterling Regional MedCenter.

## **Attendance Policy**

- 1. Nursing graduates are legally responsible for knowing what a nurse should know. The Colorado Board of Nursing requires a minimum number of hours for clinical practice before being eligible to take the licensing exam. Therefore, absenteeism is monitored closely in the Nursing Program.
- 2. All students are required to inform the nursing program office daily of any absence. The student should personally call 521-6701 at least fifteen (15) minutes before the start of class and no later than fifteen (15) after the start of class or lab that will be missed.
- 3. Students are encouraged to use the Student Health Center or see their private physician for illness. Students who are ill or physically unable to attend school three consecutive days or more must obtain a written statement from the attending physician that they may resume classes. Prolonged or frequent absences must be discussed with the director.
- 4. Outside appointments (Dr., Dentist, Lawyer, Counselor, etc.) must be made outside of class hours and are not excusable from class. If class is missed due to an appointment class activities will not be allowed to be made up.
- 5. Court appearances will be evaluated on an individual basis. If at all possible, problems requiring legal appearances should be dealt with prior to entry into the program.
- 6. Students should use their own judgment during times of severe weather. No absence will be excused due to weather, unless the college is closed, the road is closed or the instructor is not able to get to clinical. Instructors may decide to start clinical on a delayed start schedule and students will be notified accordingly of this plan including times by the administrative assistant or instructor.
- 7. If the student must be absent when an exam is scheduled the student must notify the instructor or director before the test is given or the student will not be able to make up the exam. It is expected that the exam will be made up on the first class day following the absence. Make-up exams will be taken in the Nursing Programs office, Room 214 in Phillips-Whyman, during regular work hours.
- 8. <u>Class work and Assignments</u>: Assignments are due the day the student returns. Students are responsible for contacting individual instructors regarding work missed. Instructors are not required to contact students.
- 9. <u>Classroom Absence</u>: See individual course syllabus for absence policy. Three unreported absences or no shows may result in dismissal from the program.

- 10. <u>Tardiness:</u> Consistent tardiness in any NUR course is not allowed. Instructors will deal with this on an individual basis.
- 11. <u>Lab absences:</u> Attendance is mandatory for all lab sessions. Laboratory hours and days vary by course. See course syllabi for specific requirements of each course.
- 12. Clinical Absences Reporting: The clinical facility must be notified at least one hour before the shift begins if the student is to be absent. A reason for the absence must be stated. Failure to notify the clinical facility of an absence will be dealt with in a private counseling session with the director and will result in a lowering of the clinical grade. The college should also be notified of the absence per #2 above. There is no clinical absence day that is allowed. If the student misses a clinical day it must be made up. One clinical make-up day will be scheduled at the end of each semester. If there is more than one day that must be scheduled the student will be required to pay a fee of \$45/hour to the clinical instructor for make-up time needed. Excessive absences cannot be made up and may result in dismissal from the program.

#### **EMPLOYMENT**

- 1. It is strongly recommended that no more than 12 hours per week be undertaken by the student. Hours must be arranged so that they do not interfere with school responsibilities, including required orientation to a facility, or adequate rest.
- 2. The student may not wear the student uniform or any item which identifies him/her with student status while employed for compensation.
- 3. While employed, procedures specific to the professional nursing scope of practice cannot be performed for compensation.

## Cigarette Smoking and/or Use of Drugs

Northeastern Junior College has resources to help students' quit smoking. Please see the counseling office for assistance. In addition Tobacco Free Nurses (www.tobaccofree nurses.org) is the first national initiative to help nursing students and nurses stop smoking and to empower students and nurses to engage in tobacco use prevention and cessation. NJC is a smoke free campus. Smoking is not permitted on any NJC property. No smoking will be allowed while the student is in uniform. If a student smells of smoke they may lose points on their clinical evaluation or be sent home.

Use of controlled substances, alcohol, and marijuana in the provision of nursing care (i.e., depressants, stimulants) is a violation of the Nurse Practice Act and of the NJC Student Handbook. This policy also pertains to classroom, laboratory, and any clinical related activity. Disciplinary action pursuant to the NJC Student Policy of Conduct will follow any infraction according to the NJC Student Due Process System.

Students taking medication under doctor's written permission <u>must notify the</u> <u>director immediately.</u> Use of medical marijuana is excluded from this condition as its use is not permitted at any time during the nursing program.

If a student demonstrates physical or mental impairment as a result of prescription drug use, they will be removed from the classroom or clinical area and subject to clinical failure and/or dismissal from the nursing program. Any student suspected of such use will be removed from any classroom/clinical area and will be required to undergo urine and/or blood tests.

Because alcohol and drugs, including marijuana, can adversely affect quality patient care, safety and productivity, Northeastern Junior College requires all nursing students be drug and alcohol free while in school including the clinical area. Drug screens are done at time of admission and for suspicion of drug or alcohol use. This policy does not prohibit students from possessing, using or being under the influence of prescribed medications, so long as they are used in prescribed dosage and do not compromise judgment. Whenever an instructor reasonably suspects that a student has violated this policy, the student will be directed to cooperate in testing. Reasonable suspicion may be based on, but is not limited to, the following:

- 1. Apparent drug or alcohol use, possession or impairment while at school.
- 2. Evidence of diversion or conversion of clients medications.
- 3. A clinical accident or incident which leads to an injury or property damage.
- 4. Complaints of drug use or alcohol abuse from clients, clients family, visitors, staff at the clinical facilities, or other students.
- 5. Any other reasonable basis for suspecting drug or alcohol use in violation of this policy.

Students who have positive drug test results may attempt to promptly establish a legitimate medical explanation for the results. The nursing program shall give due consideration to any timely evidence that such results were caused by lawful medication or other substances. Students who test positive or refuse to test will be dismissed from the program and referred to appropriate counseling. If proof of rehabilitation can be established, readmission to the program may be considered at a later time.

#### INSUBORDINATION AND MISCONDUCT

Insubordination or misconduct will not be tolerated. Violations will be reported to the Dean of Students and will activate the process pursuant to the NJC Procedure.

#### **Disciplinary Policy**

Northeastern Junior College student handbook has additional information on disciplinary procedures. Please refer to the student code of conduct in the NJC's student handbook, as well as System President's Procedure 4-30 Student Discipline and Board Policy 4-30 Student Disciplinary Procedure. The NJC catalog and Student Handbook can be found at <a href="https://www.njc.edu/publications/home.html">www.njc.edu/publications/home.html</a> The nursing program handbook sets high standards. This is due to the high professional standards in nursing and the need to consider patient safety. A nursing student continues to have the right to appeal any decision.

Procedure: It shall be the responsibility of the Dean of Students to discipline for any violations of the NJC code of conduct or the nursing code of conduct. Examples of activities that may result in disciplinary procedures, include but are not limited to:

- 1. Failure to give advance notice of absence from assigned clinical practice.
- 2. Evidence that there is drug/alcohol use during scheduled school activities.
- 3. Diverting drugs in the clinical setting.
- 4. Negligence in performance of nursing duties.
- 5. Failure to demonstrate behaviors indicative of professional integrity (cheating on exams, plagiarism, etc.)
- 6. Verbally or physically abusive behavior toward patients, faculty, staff, or students.
- 7. Unprofessional behavior in any setting.
- 8. Violation of the policies stated in this handbook

**Incident Reports** are completed and filed in the student's nursing program record/file when a student violates a critical behavior. The student and instructor will fill out the report with a remediation plan and date identified.

- a. The student may receive one warning before the incident report is filed, but this is at the discretion of the instructor.
- b. A student with **three** incident reports in their file for the year will result in dismissal from the program.
- c. The following are examples of critical behaviors:
  - i. Not prepared for clinicals i.e. clinical paperwork not complete

- ii. Fails to check patient allergies and ID band before administration of medications or procedures
- iii. Tardy without notifying the clinical site or absent.
- iv. Violation of Dress Code
- v. Smoking while at clinical facilities or while in uniform
- vi. Attitudinal factors or poor display of professionalism at the instructor's discretion
- vii.Cell phone use during class or clinical.
- viii. Any violation of the handbook.

## A STUDENT WILL BE PLACED ON COLLEGE SUMMARY SUSPENSION IF SAFETY TO THE PATIENT BECOMES A FACTOR (see p. 81-83 in the NJC Student Handbook).

The following are examples that may lead to college suspension:

- 1. Charting or reporting completion of nursing interventions or medical orders when in fact such action was not taken
- 2. Failure to report errors
- 3. Assuming responsibilities or performing skills in which the student has not been instructed or those not within the Scope of Practice
- 4. Violation of confidentiality
- 5. Unsafe performance of clinical practice

The due process of the disciplinary procedure shall occur as soon as possible following the event of summary suspension if requested by the student,

Students are also expected to adhere to the other rights, freedoms, and responsibilities outlined in the Student Code of Conduct, in the Northeastern Junior College Handbook, and the current college catalog. #### **Student Grievance Procedure**

The student grievance procedure is intended to allow students an opportunity to present an issue that they feel warrants action. This includes the right to secure educational benefits and services without regard to sex, race, national origin, or ancestry, creed, color, disability, or age and have the issue considered in a prompt and equitable fashion.

#### COUNSELING AND GUIDANCE

- 1. Each student has planned conferences during the school year. Attendance at all conferences is required for satisfactory completion of the program, and all conferences are recorded in the student's progress file. Conferences occur at the mid-term and end of fall and spring semesters and culminate with a final conference at the end of the program in December.
  - a. Students may confer with faculty members upon request in addition to the regularly scheduled conferences. Faculty may also set up additional conferences if issues/concerns arise.
- 2. NJC's Counseling Department is available on campus in the Hays Student Center for personal, academic, and career concerns or issues.

#### **EVALUATION - PROGRESS - ACHIEVEMENT**

- 1. Records, including both clinical and didactic, for each student are kept in a cumulative file with the permanent and concurrent progress record. Students are strongly encouraged to review this record at least once a week. The student is required to initial their file folder each time the record is accessed to document frequent review of progress by the student.
- 2. Records are accompanied by anecdotal and conference notes written by faculty to document progress. Students and faculty sign these forms at each conference to acknowledge progress review was completed.
- 3. Testing will be one form of evaluation to measure progress and may be conducted via paper/pencil exams, computerized exams, or in a laboratory skills check-off format. Grades will be earned for each course.
- 4. Kaplan is a testing service utilized in the program. Mandatory testing and remediation will be required in selected courses and may be used in configuration of final course grades. In addition, practice assessments are available and students are strongly encouraged to complete these in conjunction with matching course work. The practice assessments may be used in some courses as tickets to enter or test.

It is the goal of this program and of the faculty to assist each student to avail him/herself of the opportunities to succeed. Recognition is given to the fact that there are individual differences which will vary widely so these guidelines are to assist the student to align his/her goals with those of the program.

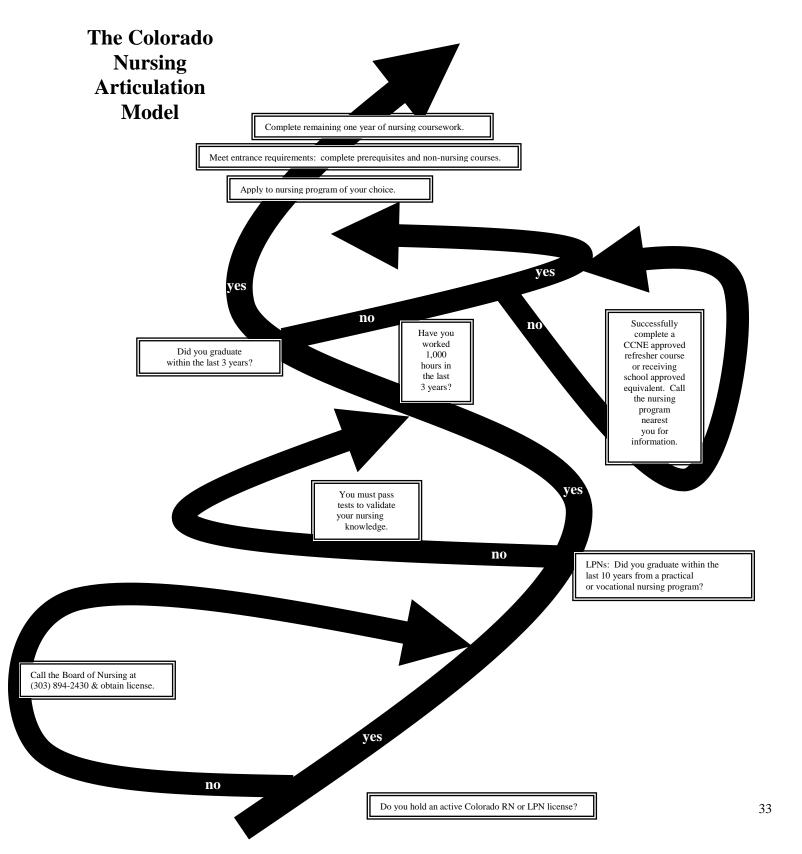
