Colorado Community College System and University of Phoenix FAQ

How much do Colorado Community College System employees save?

All Colorado Community College System employees are eligible to save 5 percent on the cost of tuition for any bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees at University of Phoenix. Also, employees are eligible for a 100% waiver of fees associated with Prior Learning Assessment.

Can employees receive any college credit for prior training?

Many training courses offered by employers have been evaluated by University of Phoenix and may qualify for college credit toward an associate's or bachelor's degree. Through Prior Learning Assessment (PLA), students may be eligible to receive up to 15 credits toward an associate's degree and up to 30 credits toward a bachelor's degree. The PLA process applies only to associate's or bachelor's degree candidates, and awarded credits are limited to elective or general education requirements. Does University of Phoenix accept transfer credits?

Yes, we accept transfer credits from regionally and select nationally accredited institutions of higher learning. However, certain transfer credits may not be applicable to your degree program.


How long will it take to complete a degree?

How can a current University of Phoenix student identify themselves as a Colorado Community College System employee?

Current University of Phoenix students can identify themselves as Colorado Community College System employees through the University of Phoenix eCampus site to receive the tuition reduction. To identify themselves via eCampus, students will need to log in, select the "Account" tab, and click on the "Employer/Tribal Partnership Program" link. They should then select "Colorado Community College System" and answer all the pertinent questions.

Are there any savings available for Colorado Community College System graduates?

University of Phoenix will provide a 5% tuition reduction and a 100% PLA fee reduction to new students entering into a Bachelor Program at University who obtain an Associate's Degree from Colorado Community College System after 9/2/11. After new students are confirmed as having an Associate's Degree from Colorado Community College System, reduced tuition will apply to the then current rates at the time the student enrolls in a course. All students are subject to the University's admission policies.
