Popular transfer majors include Business/Accounting, Education, Psychology, Science, and Agriculture. Popular vocational programs include practical nursing, ADN, cosmetology, automotive technology, equine management, business, and agri-business. We offer 15 Career/Technical Education programs.

Online and Hybrid Courses — Students have a wide variety in course delivery options. In addition to traditional classroom based courses, they can also take online or hybrid courses. Online courses are delivered in a format that never requires on-campus attendance. Hybrid courses are a mix of online and face-to-face formats with the bulk of the class delivered online. These formats provide access and flexibility to the working adult or the commuting student. Online courses have higher tuition (\$259.30/cr) than hybrid or classroom based courses (\$96.25/cr) as mandated by the CCCS system.
